## **Showing respect for nature**

Each May, the Lindsborg Convention & Visitors Bureau has the privilege of working with USD 400 fourth grade students and faculty on a community service project. In the past we have enjoyed workdays at Coronado Heights--picking up trash, planting native Kansas perennial grass and wildflower seed, and finishing the day out with learning more about Lindsborg history and the importance of travel and tourism to our local economy.

Last year we enjoyed a new type of project, planting a pollinators garden along several small sections of the north spur of the Välkommen Trail. We encourage you to take a walk and see for yourself the fruits of our labor. Right now, there are multiple kinds of native Kansas wildflowers blooming and the milkweed is plentiful, providing food for Monarch butterflies and their pupae as they

make their annual trek across the United States from Mexico. We feel that these types of projects teach the students to respect our community assets, helping them understand the need to preserve them for the next generation...at least that is one of our main goals as we spend time planning and carrying out these annual projects.

This year, we were able to partner with several granting agencies to provide funds to plant an additional pollinators garden along the Meadowlark Trail. Thanks to local volunteers, staff, and K-State Research & Extension, we were able to provide three different educational components for students to learn more about water conservation, the importance of bees, and the life cycle of the Monarch butterfly and the species' importance to pollination. After a fun time of hands-on learning in Riverside Park, we took busses to the planting site, located on the second mile of the Meadowlark Trail. Students and faculty scattered multiple pounds of wildflower seed and planted more than 200 milkweed plants. We ended the day with conversation about the things we love about our community and how we can share this "news" with others, helping grow the number of visitors enjoying Lindsborg throughout the year. We were pleasantly surprised at how many students were able to quickly list a variety of things they LOVE about where they live!

We encourage you to take a walk along the Meadowlark Trail next summer to see how this project blooms in its first season! Thanks to USD 400, City of Lindsborg Parks Staff, Monarch Watch, K-State Research & Extension, McPherson County Conservation District, and Saline County Uplanders; Pheasants Forever/ Quail Forever for your generous contributions to this project.

## Powering the city; respecting the grid

#### Ordinance 5331: Breaking it Down

This ordinance, which went into effect July 1, adopts new Interconnection Standards for Installation of Parallel Operation of Customer-Owned Renewable Electric Generation Facilities.

- The original Interconnection standards (Ord. 4552) were adopted in 2008. Ord. 5331 adopts the current standards for interconnections which address safety and reliability for both customers and utilities.
- Ord. 5331 also changes how a customer is credited for excess energy delivered back to the utility. Previously, under the net-metering



policy (Ord. 4788), owners of renewable generation facilities would be charged for the net kWh of what was delivered by the utility and what was delivered back to the utility from the customer's system. As explained in Ord. 5332 (pg. 5), customers with Renewable Generation Systems will now be credited back for 150% of the utility's avoided energy cost. Customers will be responsible for any energy delivered from the utility as well as any distribution charges from energy delivered from the utility and for the distribution charges for energy delivered back to the utility grid for excess energy their system produces.

This ordinance helps the city to better align with today's current standards of energy charges and more accurately reflect the costs associated with electric service. The electric industry has changed dramatically over the last decade and **making this change helps the city to ensure rates are structured best to deliver reliable electricity to your home and business.** 

#### IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO ADD SOLAR...

- 1. Complete and submit to the Public Works Department the *Renewable Energy Parallel Generation Application for Service*. This is available by request from the city.
- 2. The customer must pay a \$250 non-refundable processing fee with the application.
- 3. The application must include information about the solar company/contractor/engineer, as well as a one-line diagram of the generation facility and site layout (samples are provided to assist with this step).
- 4. The Utility will notify the customer of any costs necessary to connect the Generation Facility to the Electric Distribution System.
- 5. After review and if approved by the Utility, the customer must agree to the terms and conditions of the *Interconnection Standards*.
- 6. After installation of solar, the customer must return the *Certificate of Completion* prior to the commencement of operation of the generation facility.

Following these simple steps ensures the "right sizing" of your system, and prevents pushing too much power back onto the city's grid, which could result in excess fees and affect others' power supply.

# READING YOUR ELECTRIC BILL

Two new ordinances address electric rate classes and rate structure and interconnection standards for those homeowners who have or are thinking about renewable energy. The first, Ord. 5331, was outlined on pg. 4.

Ordinance 5332, which took effect Jan. 1, amended the customer classes by dividing commercial into separate classes. Now, there are residential, small commercial (up to 80,000 kWhs annually), and large commercial (greater than 80,000 kWhs annually) classes.

This ordinance also changes the rate structure and separates or unbundles charges. Instead of one blended kWh rate, the rates are unbundled to cover distribution and energy separately.

The monthly electric bill, under Ord. 5332, shall be calculated by adding the following:

- 1. Monthly customer service charge; and
- 2. Distribution charge; and
- 3. Energy charge, and
- 4. Rate riders, which can also be included in the rate schedule for a Power Cost Adjustment and Energy Efficiency Adder.

The distribution charge is calculated by multiplying the distribution charge by the sum of monthly billed energy (kWh) consumed by the Customer and monthly billed energy (kWh) sent (exported) to the Utility (if a customer installs Renewable Parallel Generation).


The *energy charge* will be calculated by multiplying the energy charge by the monthly billed energy (kWh) consumed by the Customer.





Energy generated by Renewable Parallel Generation, in excess of customer load, will be credited at 150% of the Utility's monthly system average cost of energy per kWh. Excess energy that exceeds the energy used by the customer's load over a 12-month period shall not be compensated.

## **Back-to-School Safety**

Back-to-school time is exciting for kindergarteners to college students, parents and school staff. Back to school is also an exciting time for pesty crooks who like to exploit unsuspecting victims as our streets fill up with students carrying valuables, and parking lots fill up with vehicles.

Here are tips to help make your school year a safe one:

- Be sure your child(ren) know their home phone number (including area code) address, your work number, the number of another trusted adult, and how to use 911.
- Plan a walking route to school or the bus stop. Choose the most direct way with the fewest street crossings. If you can, test the route with your child. Tell them to stay away from vacant lots, fields, and other places where there aren't many people around.



- Teach children to obey all traffic signals, signs, and crosswalks. Remember, drivers have had a few months without kids walking regularly and may not be paying attention the first couple of weeks.
- If possible, make sure they walk to and from school with others.
- When carpooling, drop off and pick up children as close to school as safely possible. Don't leave until
  they have entered the school yard or building. DO NOT park in violation of "no parking signs."
- Teach your child never to talk to strangers or accept rides or gifts from strangers. Remember, a stranger is someone you or your children don't know or trust.
- If your child is home alone for a few hours after school:
  - 1. Set up rules for locking doors and windows, answering the door or telephone.
  - 2. Talk about what activities your child can and cannot do while home alone.
  - 3. Make sure they check in with you or a neighbor immediately after school.
  - 4. Agree on rules for inviting friends over and for going to a friend's house when no adult is home.
- Take time to listen carefully to children's fears and feelings about people or places that scare them
  or make them feel uneasy. Tell them to trust their instincts. Take complaints about bullies and other
  concerns seriously.
- Teach your kids to stay alert when they walk to and from school. This means refraining from listening
  to music in both ears and always watching for suspicious persons or vehicles.
- If you choose to send your kids to school with valuables such as iPods, iPads, laptops, smartphones, etc., ask them to keep the items hidden in a backpack as they travel to and from school. They should also keep a close eye on their property throughout the day.
- If you park your vehicle at school, make sure the alarm is on, all doors are locked, and all valuables are removed from plain view.

Many people take for granted that we live in a safe and peaceful community where folks respect each other and their property. However, there are always a few people out there who look to take advantage of those who are unsuspecting of their surroundings. Use these tips to help prevent you or a loved one from becoming a victim.

A newly funded project has begun at Swensson Park: the murals at Viking Valley are expected to be replaced within a year. These murals, located on the fence that borders the playground, have been part of the playground since it was constructed in 2004, originally created by local artists and school children. The murals represent a community effort in building a vibrant and friendly place to raise a family.

Unfortunately, due to time and the environment, the murals have fallen into disrepair. After inspection, it was concluded that something needed to be done to replace the artwork. The Parks Department, with help from generous members of the community, has collected donations for new artwork. This money allowed for possible matching grant opportunities; and after applying for grants, one has been awarded from the National Endowment for the Arts in association with the Kansas Department of Commerce to fully fund the rest of the project.

The department reached out to local artists with the help of the Convention & Visitors Bureau. As a result, we have committed artists for all the panels: Cal McNichols, Angela Rider, Patricia Pender, Jenny Davis, Channing Wall, and Jennifer Krob.

The subject matter follows the loose idea of the previous panels depicted. The project specified that local artists would create community-themed artwork. The art is to represent a sense of community and the local area. The artists will create a panel in their own style and portray ideas of what it means to them.

The Parks Department is happy to take on this project in conjunction with local artists, and to pay respects to both our past panels and the future of the mural space. The response from the community has been outstanding and truly shows the pride that Lindsborg has for its community.

#### **NEW SIGHTING: FOOD TRUCKS!**

City Council established the Mobile Food Vending Pilot Program in March. Since then, 10 food trucks have applied to become vendors, including exciting food options like Tibetan-style dumplings, Smashburgers, onion blossoms, and more! As a reminder, all mobile food vendors are now required to apply for a permit to operate in Lindsborg, regardless of whether they intend to operate on public or private property.

Permits are free of charge during the Mobile Food Vending Pilot Program, which runs through July 2023.


