A Regal Prince upright oak was planted in Riverside Park on April 20. 2022 in honor of the 150th celebration of Arbor Day and in recognition of Smoky Valley Middle School (SVMS) student. Mollie Deines. Deines was selected by the Lindsborg Tree Board as poster contest winner from Smoky Valley Middle School. She was then selected as the regional winner by the community forester. The poster competition is held every spring. City staff, Community Forester Tim McDonnell, Tree Board members, residents, and

Lindsborg recognized as Tree City USA for the 37th year!

The Tree Board attended the annual Tree City USA recognition day at Rollings Hills Zoo in March. The Kansas Forest Service had several lectures, and the state winner of the poster contest was recognized. There are several conditions that must be met to be a verified Tree City USA community, and Lindsborg has met these requirements for the last 37 years. The requirements are:

• Standard 1: Form a Tree Board or Department

Delegating responsibility for city-owned trees is the first official step to becoming a Tree City. By forming a tree board or department, cities can create a more organized and effective urban forestry plan.

- Standard 2: Establish a Tree Care Ordinance A public tree care ordinance assigns clear authority over public trees and provides clear guidance for planting, maintaining, and/or removing trees from streets, parks, and other public spaces.
- Standard 3: Maintain a Community Forestry Program with an Annual Budget of at Least \$2 Per Capita.

This is intended to demonstrate an ongoing investment in public trees.

 Standard 4: Proclaim and Observe Arbor Day Celebrating Arbor Day and passing an official holiday proclamation helps create pride for our urban canopy.

Lindsborg Tree Planting Cost Share Program

Trees are a valuable resource to the citizens of Lindsborg. To offset the loss of trees and to increase the diversity of our urban forest, the City of Lindsborg is offering a tree planting cost share program. This program was initiated by the Lindsborg Tree Board. These trees can be planted on street parking or on private property. The following stipulations will apply to this program:

- 1. Tree species must be selected from the current city tree recommended list.
- 2. The planting location must be approved by the Tree Board.
- 3. Property owners are eligible for up to two tree cost shares per year.
- 4. The city will reimburse half the cost of the tree, up to a maximum of \$50 per tree.
- 5. The program is limited to available funds and is on a first-come, first-served basis.

To participate in the program, contact Parks Superintendent Noah Flores by calling City Hall at 785-227-3355, or stop by City Hall for an application form. Return the completed form and wait for a call from Noah about your request. The current city tree list is as follows:

The spacing of street trees in residential areas will be in accordance with the three species size classes listed above. No trees may be planted closer together than the following:

Small trees - 30 feet. Medium trees - 40 feet. Large trees - 50 feet.

The distance trees may be planted from curbs or curb lines and sidewalks will be in accordance with the three species size classes above. No trees may be planted closer to any curb or sidewalk than the following:

Small trees - 2 feet. Medium trees - 3 feet. Large trees - 4 feet. No trees may be planted closer than 50 feet to any corner.



Be Prepared with Flood Awareness

The local flood hazard is caused by Lindsborg's flat terrain and slow storm water runoff. Cow Creek is in the 1% Special Flood Hazard Area, and poses a flash flooding threat because of the large drainage area (345 acres) and lack of elevation drop. But other areas have risk, too. In 2013, the Westview channel overtopped into the West Normal and Northridge neighborhoods, causing significant basement flooding and millions of dollars in losses. Street flooding occurs on the city's eastern and southern neighborhoods, resulting in stalled and water-damaged vehicles. Find out if your property is in the regulated floodplain by visiting the Kansas Floodplain Viewer and entering your address at: https://gis2.kda.ks.gov/gis/ksfloodplain/Here are some things you can do to protect your family and property from flooding:

Flood Insurance

Your homeowner's insurance does not include coverage for a flood. One of the best protection measures is a flood insurance policy under the National Flood Insurance Program, which can be purchased through any licensed property insurance agent. If your house is located in a floodplain, flood insurance will be required by most federally backed mortgage lenders. Even if you are not in a mapped floodplain, you may be subject to flooding from local drainage. Ask an insurance agent how much a flood insurance policy would cost.

Don't delay! There is a 30-day waiting period before a flood insurance policy takes effect. Learn the essentials to flood insurance, including what it covers, what it protects and who it protects at <u>floodsmart.gov</u>

Protect People from the Hazard


Flash floods are the number one weather related killer in the United States. Do not attempt to walk or drive in flooded areas. Six inches of floodwater is enough to knock you off your feet, two feet of water will

float your car. Do not drive around barriers, as the road or bridge may be washed out. Water moving at 10 miles per hour exerts the same pressure on a structure as wind gusts at 270 miles per hour.

• Protect Property from the Hazard There are preventive measures that can be taken to minimize or eliminate potential flood damage to buildings. Sandbags, plywood, plastic sheeting and lumber can be used to temporarily protect property. Moving furniture and other possessions to higher floors, if available, can reduce contents losses. Permanent flood proofing measures for flood prone areas are preferable to temporary ones. Talk to us about protecting your house or business at Community Development. Build Responsibly

Any development, not just construction of buildings, in a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) requires a permit. Obtain a permit from at City Hall, 101 S. Main St. before you build, alter, re-grade or fill on your property. Safe Home while on Vacation

As the summer months approach, it is a great time for a vacation. While many of us find it as an opportunity to visit local attractions or distant places, others find summertime to be an opportunity to break into homes while occupants are away.

• Make sure you have effective locks that are being used. Even the best locks can't protect you if you don't use them. Lock doors, windows, side gates, garage door, and garage side access doors.



- Do some yard work before you leave the house for an extended period. Trim your hedges and bushes so thieves can't have a chance to hide out, or that you won't give the impression your home has been left unattended and vacant.
- Get to know your neighbors before your trip. Neighbors who look out for each other are among the best and least expensive defenses against neighborhood crime. Daily, have your neighbor pick up your mail, newspapers, packages, and advertisements left at your doorstep. Or, make a quick trip to the post office and complete a document to have them hold your mail until you return.
- Remember to secure any spare keys you have. Leave a spare key with a trusted neighbor; never hide it on the property. Burglars have more experience looking for keys than you do hiding them.
- Let there be light and make sure all outside entrances of the home are well lit. A timer or solarpowered lights on the front, back and side of the house make it difficult for burglars to hide.
- Leave lights and radio/TV on a timer inside your home to give the impression that it is occupied.
- Invest in an alarm and use signs and stickers to warn would-be burglars. An alarm system controls
 access points to your home and lets you know if someone has invaded your space. A loud audible
 alarm will most likely scare a burglar away as soon as it is activated. Also, advise your alarm
 company that you will be away on vacation, and no one will be entering the home during your absence.
- Investing in a camera system for your home is an excellent tool for your home's protection, and it can work as both a deterrent and a recovery tool. Burglars are wary of properties with visible security cameras. If a crime does occur, security cameras can help gather evidence to help law enforcement identify who the culprit is.

Remember, burglars focus on convenience, concealment, and camouflage. Think twice before posting upcoming vacations on social media outlets. You'd be surprised how fast that information can travel on the information highway—and sometimes to the wrong people. Instead, post your vacation pictures after you've returned.

Vacations are meant to be fun times with family and friends, not a time of convenience for thieves and potential burglars. Keep your homes safe and secure and make your trip a memorable one with these simple precautions.

WATER-SAVING TIPS

The average American household wastes nearly 10,000 gallons each year from easy-to-fix water leaks—that's the amount of water needed to wash 300 loads of laundry. If that doesn't seem like a lot, consider that across the country, easy-to-fix household leaks can add up to nearly 1 trillion gallons of water lost every year.


There are some easy steps that homeowners can take to help save water in their community now and for future generations. Fixing household leaks not only saves water but reduces water utility bills—by about 10 percent. Be for water and start saving today with three simple steps: Check. Twist. Replace. **1. Check**

First, encourage customers to check their homes for leaks. An easy way to start is to examine winter water use. If it exceeds 12,000 gallons per month for a family of four, there may be leaks. Walk around the home with eyes and ears open to find leaks, and don't forget to check pipes and outdoor spigots. Look for silent toilet leaks, a common water-wasting culprit, by adding a few drops of food coloring to the toilet tank and waiting 10 minutes before flushing. If any color appears in the bowl during that time, your toilet has a leak. Visit epa.gov/ watersense for do-it-yourself repair tips or contact a plumbing professional.

2. Twist

Apply pipe tape to be sure plumbing fixture connections are sealed tight and give leaking faucets and showerheads a


firm twist with a wrench. If the drops can't be stopped, contact your favorite plumbing professional. For additional savings, twist a WaterSense labeled aerator onto each bathroom faucet to save water without noticing a difference in flow. Faucet aerators cost a few dollars or less and can save a household more



than 500 gallons each year—the amount of water it takes to shower 180 times!

3. Replace

If you just can't nip that drip, it may be time to replace the fixture. Look for WaterSense labeled models, which use at least 20 percent less water and are independently certified to perform as well or better than standard plumbing fixtures. Replacing an old, inefficient showerhead with a WaterSense labeled model will shrink your household's water footprint by 2,700 gallons annually. With less hot water passing through, WaterSense labeled showerheads can also save enough energy to power a television for a year.

Why should you think about what you flush?

Whether it be for personal hygiene or cleaning, flushable products are not designed to break down in the sewer system. Flushable wipes travel miles and spend hours in the sewers. They can go through multiple pumps and still arrive at the wastewater treatment plant completely intact. While wipes are easily flushed, most do not break down in the sewer system. Because they do not break down, it is easy for them to get hung up in sewer lines. Because there are so many flushable wipes in the system, plugs caused by them are becoming more frequent. More frequent plugs increase the odds that at some point a sewer backup caused by "flushable wipes" could affect you. Sewer systems are not designed to handle all the modern products available to consumers. Manufacturers are starting to make flushable products that are also biodegradable but there is still some concern as to how quickly these products will break down. Manufacturers are making products that complement our busy lifestyles to make our lives easier. As consumers, we buy these products and assume that there should be no issues caused by using them, however, this is not always the case. There are many lawsuits filed against the manufacturers of wipes and products marked "flushable." Many of these lawsuits have been filed by municipalities because of the problems created in sewer and pumping systems. Remember you can help reduce the possibility of a sewer backup by not flushing wipes; please take the time to dispose of wipes properly. The only things that should be going down a toilet are human waste and toilet paper.

FOG

Have you ever given a second thought to what happens when you dump the grease left from cooking supper down the kitchen sink? Have you ever thought about what happens when you throw the meat scraps down the garbage disposal and just turn on the switch? You probably haven't. Fats, Oils, and Greases are referred to as FOG. The Fats are mainly from meats, vegetables, and dairy sources. Oils are mainly from oils used to prepare food, while Grease comes from the melting of fats during cooking. So how does FOG cause problems? Most of the time while cleaning the kitchen, FOG is poured down the drain as a warm liquid. The FOG then cools as it flows thru the sewer line, then it begins to solidify and stick to sewer lines. Over time, the FOG can build up to the point that it can cause a blockage that then results in a sewer backup.

The evidence shows up in the lift stations around town, in the sewer lines when they are cleaned, and

in the wet well at the wastewater treatment plant. Please take a few extra minutes and follow these simple steps to help reduce this growing problem.

- 1) Never pour grease and oils from cooking down the sink or into toilets. Dump cooking grease and oils into containers and dispose of them in the trash.
- **2)** Scrape grease and food scraps from cooking and meals into containers and use them in composting piles or dispose of them in the trash.
- **3)** Treat garbage disposals as a device only used to clean up the residue left in the sink, not to get rid of the leftovers from a meal. Grinding up meat scraps in the garbage disposal on a regular basis will increase your chances of having sewer problems at some point.

If everyone can do their part to help reduce FOG, we can reduce the possibility of sewer backups that can cause the potential exposure to disease-causing organisms, foul orders, and an unpleasant expensive clean-up.
